

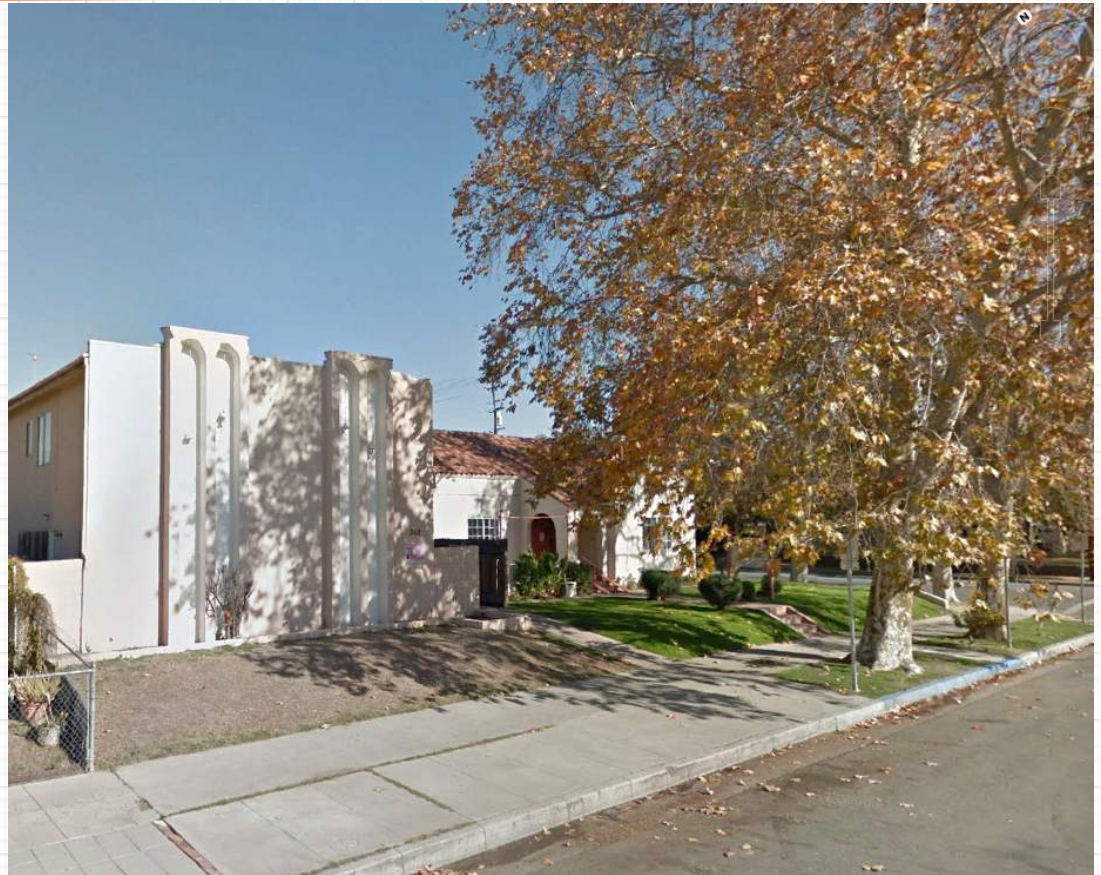
Articulating Physical Character through Frontage Types

What is ‘Frontage’?

Frontage is the area between the facade of a building and the parking lane in front of each lot. Frontage is broken down into two parts: Public Frontage is the area from the parking space in front of a building to the back of the sidewalk (the right-of-way); Private Frontage is the area from the back of the sidewalk to the facade of the building. This is not about architecture but about the placement and size of elements needed to make positive streetscapes.

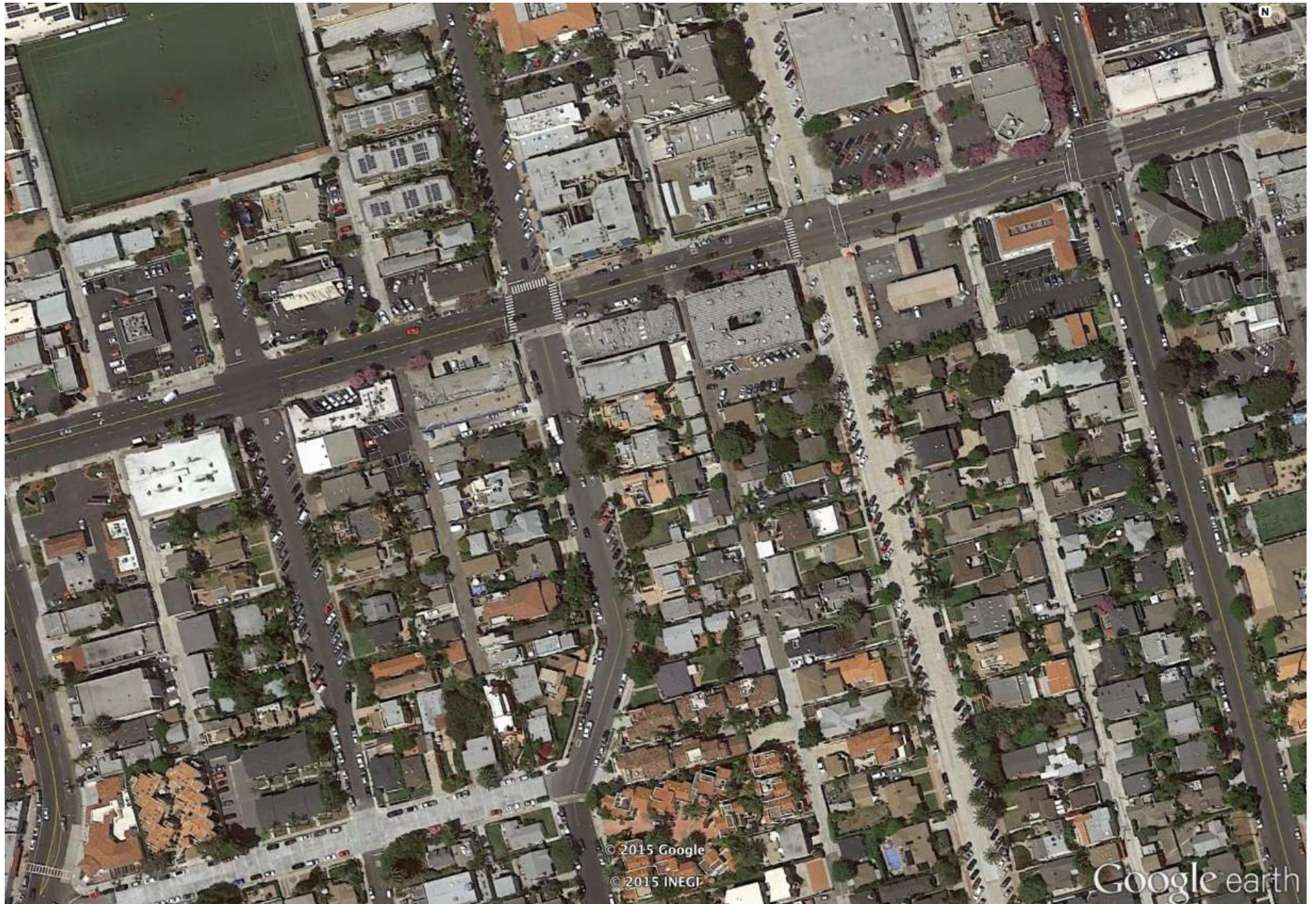




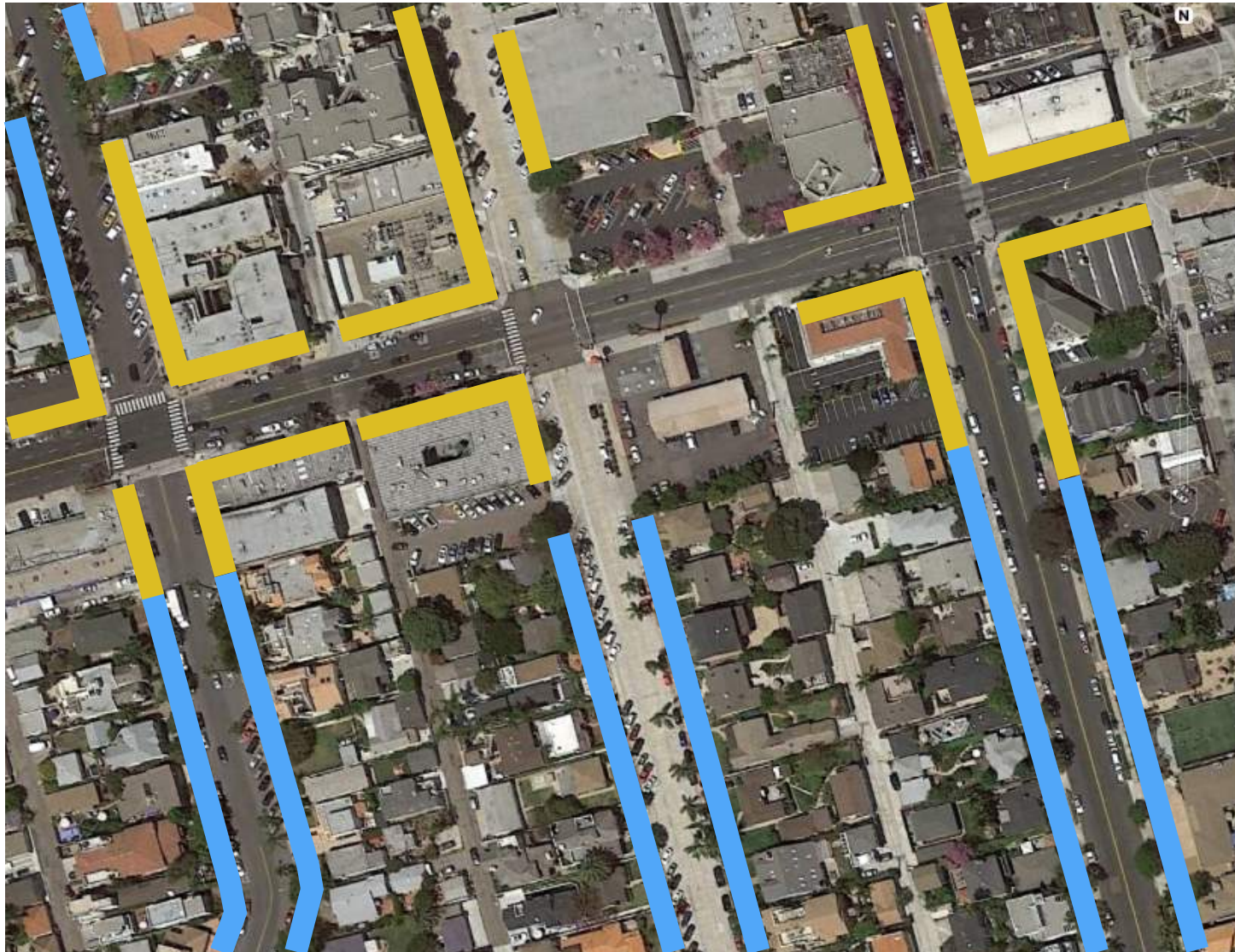




The built environment: Patterns of Frontages



The built environment: Repeating Patterns



Frontage Types: **Less Urban** and **More Urban**

The blue highlighted properties are examples of buildings with less urban frontages and streetscapes and the yellow highlighted properties are examples of more urban frontages and streetscapes. Portions of properties without any label contain parking adjacent to the streetscape.

Table 2-3B identifies the range of appropriate frontage types and their general characteristics for Tehachapi as a whole. These frontage types carry out the community vision by responding to the variety of physical contexts throughout town.

The diagram at right illustrates the range of frontage types on a continuum from less to more intense. Intensity is not focused on land use but on physical character.

Each frontage type, independent of architectural style, interacts with and shapes the public realm on the basis of an individual building.

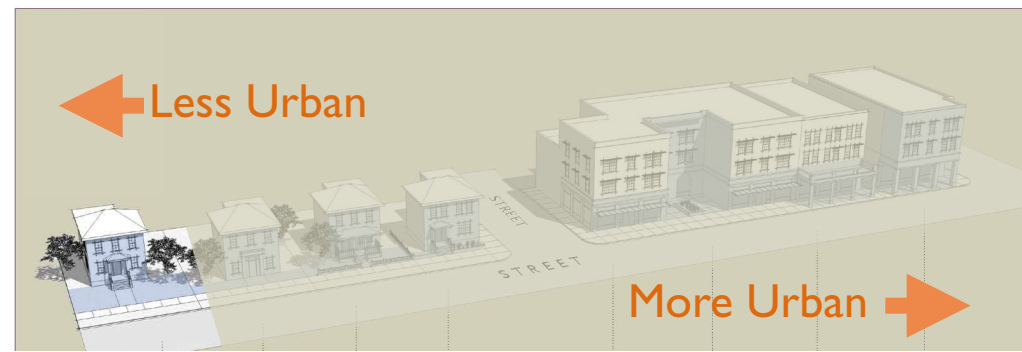

Frontage Types

This section progresses through a range of frontage types found in communities across the U.S. from the lowest intensity of buildings and physical contexts to the most intense of buildings and physical contexts. Each frontage type profile provides a classification of form, description of the type, the transect zones it's typically found in, and its typical characteristics.

Common Yard



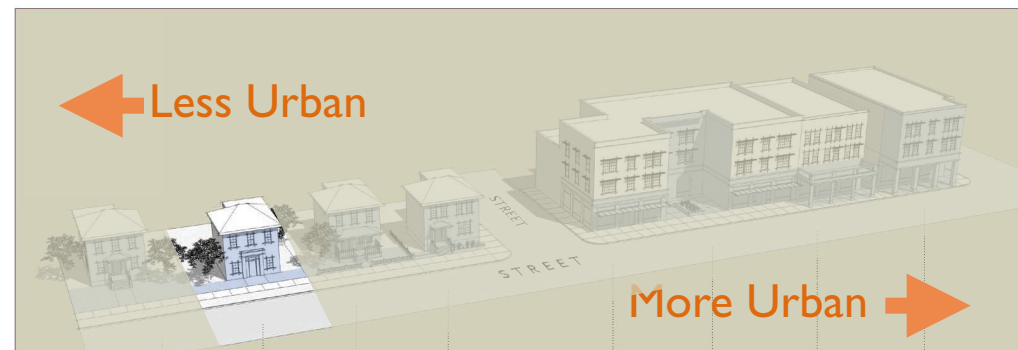
Description

The main facade of the building has a large planted setback from the frontage line providing a buffer from the higher-speed thoroughfares. The front yard created remains unfenced and is visually continuous with adjacent yards, supporting a common landscape and working in conjunction with the other private frontages.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T3, T4
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Front Yard



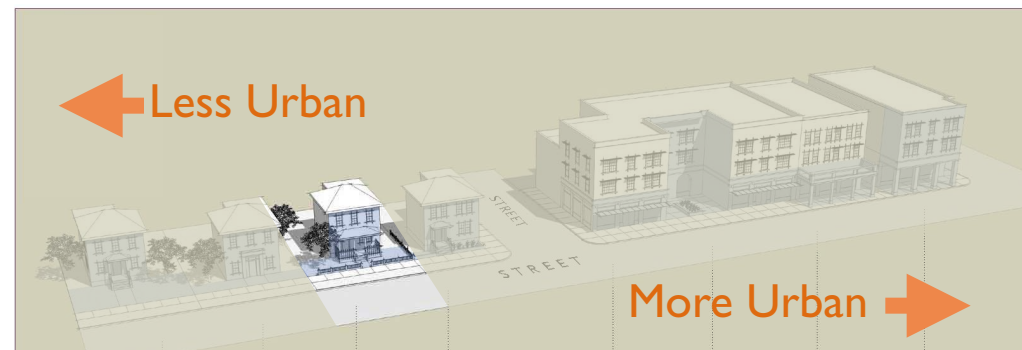
Description

The front yard frontage consists of the building facade being set back from the frontage line in a dimension that results in larger, landscaped areas than all of the other frontages except common yard. Front yards are fenced or unfenced, and in general, create a visually continuous landscape along the block. Landscape ranges from fully landscaped to a combination of hardscape and landscape. In response to site topography, front yards may be raised while maintaining a pedestrian-oriented streetscape.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T3, T4
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Porch



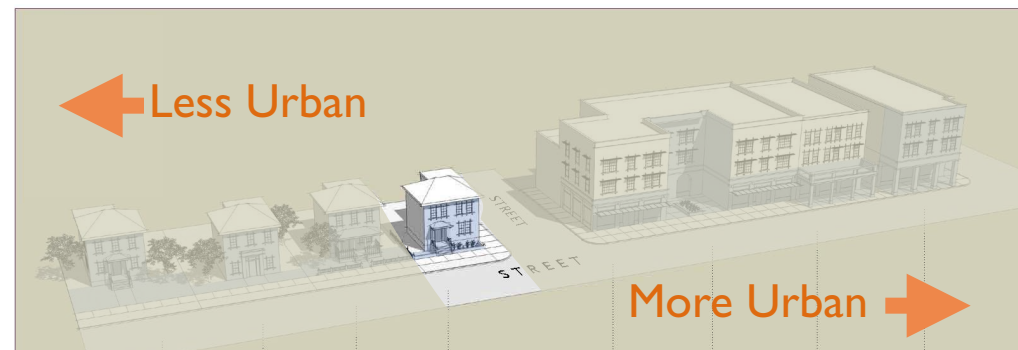
Description

The main facade of the building has a small to medium setback from the frontage line. The resulting front yard is typically very small and can be defined by a fence or hedge to spatially maintain the edge of the street. The projecting porch is open on three sides and all habitable space is located behind the setback line.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T3, T4, T4MS
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Stoop



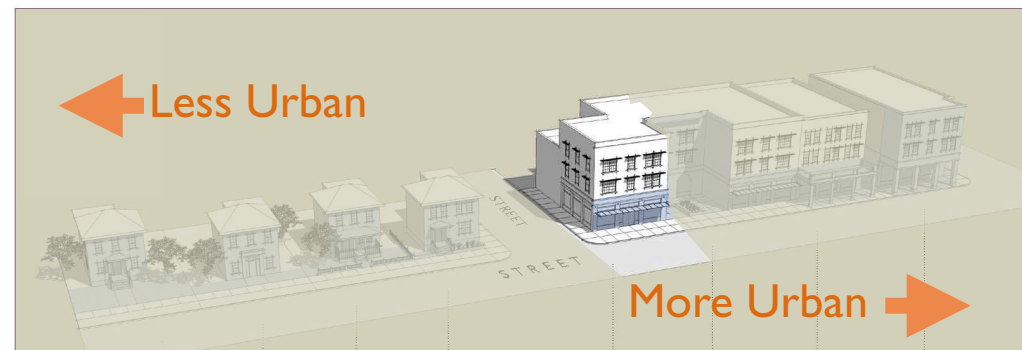
Description

The main facade of the building is near the frontage line and the elevated stoop engages the sidewalk. The stoop shall be elevated above the sidewalk to ensure privacy within the building. Stairs from the stoop may lead directly to the sidewalk or may be side-loaded. This type is appropriate for residential uses with a small setback.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T4, T4MS, T5, T6
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Shopfront



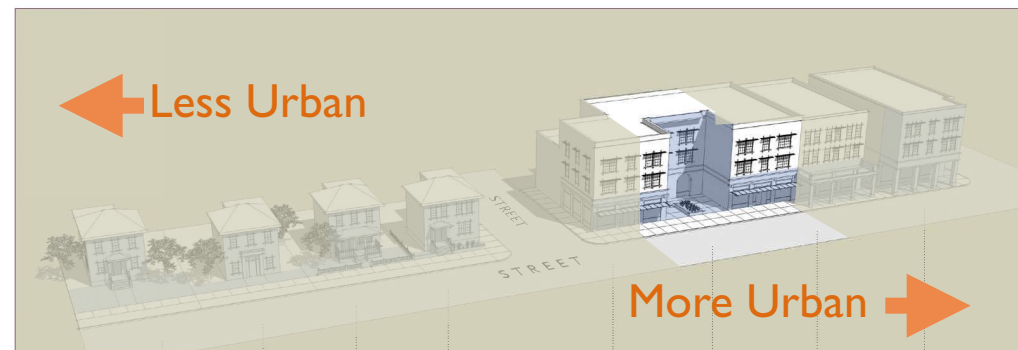
Description

The main facade of the building is at or near the frontage line with an at-grade entrance along the public way. This type is intended for retail use. It has substantial glazing at the sidewalk level and may include an awning that may overlap the sidewalk. It may be used in conjunction with other frontage types.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T4MS, T5, T6
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Forecourt



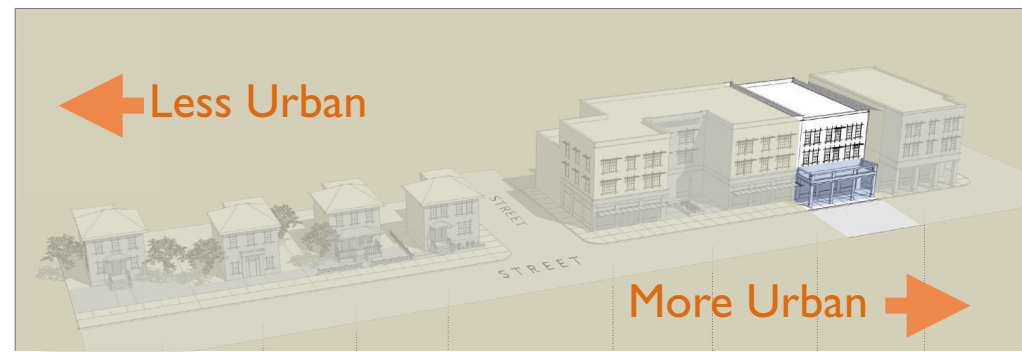
Description

The main facade of the building is at or near the frontage line and a small percentage is set back, creating a small court space. The space could be used as an entry court or shared garden space for apartment buildings, or as an additional shopping or restaurant seating area within commercial areas.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T4, T4MS, T5, T6
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Gallery



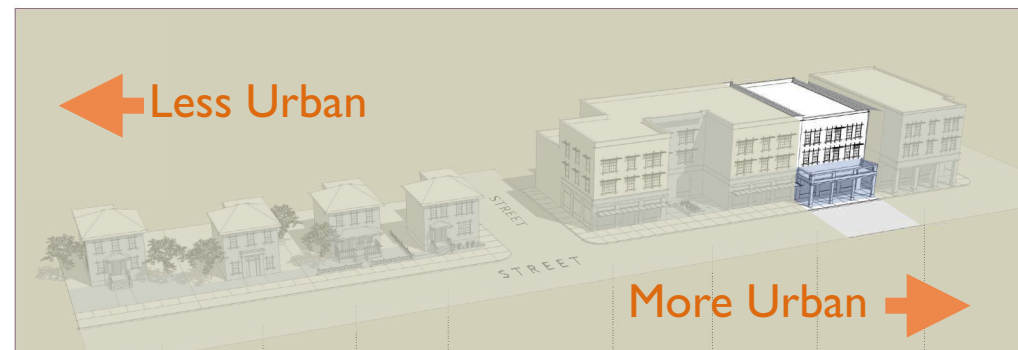
Description

The main facade of the building is at the frontage line and the gallery element overlaps the sidewalk. This type is intended for buildings with ground-floor commercial uses and may be one or two stories. The gallery should provide the primary circulation along a frontage and extend far enough from the building to provide adequate protection and circulation for pedestrians

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T4MS, T5, T6
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Terrace



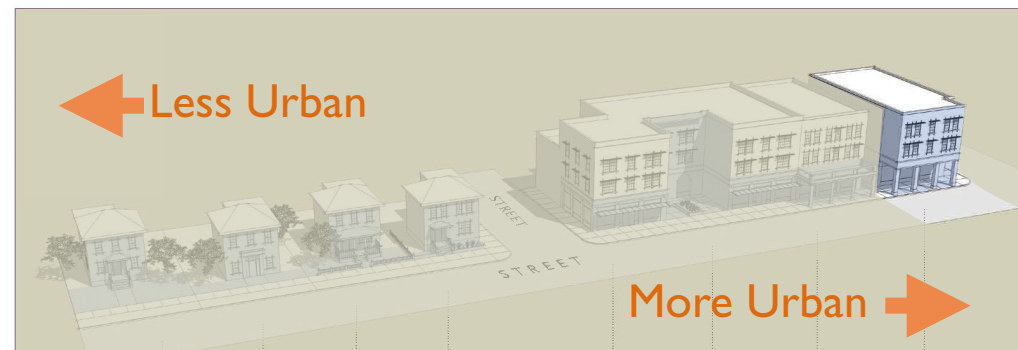
Description

The main facade is at or near the frontage line with an elevated terrace providing public circulation along the facade. This type can be used to provide at-grade access while accommodating a grade change. Frequent steps up to the terrace are necessary to avoid dead walls and maximize access. This type may also be used in historic industrial areas to mimic historic loading docks.

Physical Characteristics

- Context: T4MS, T5, T6
- Streetscape: formal or informal

Arcade



Description

The main ground floor facade is set back from the property line and upper floors align with or are near the property line. A colonnade structurally and visually supports the building mass, creating a very urban street character. Unless used on a civic building, arcades contain ground-floor shopfronts, making them ideal for retail use as the arcade shelters the pedestrian while shading the storefront glass.

Articulating Character

The physical character of a built environment is defined by the components that comprise that environment. As described in the previous slides, Building Types are a primary component of the built environment. In this section, each Building Type is allocated to a transect zone to achieve a particular built environment. The ability to use building types to respond to site conditions is illustrated through the following examples.

Frontage Types are an integral component of Form-Based Codes because they regulate the critical interface between individual building facades and the adjacent streetscape. Depending upon the building length, multiple frontages can be applied to one building to articulate different physical character from one end of the building to the other, or on corner lots from one side of a parcel to the other.



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
